PASTORS REPORT

Dear Parishioners:

I would like to call your attention to a few significant things happening this month. First, this coming Tuesday, we recognize the Feast of the Presentation of our Lord. This feast is celebrated 40 days after Christmas. It is known as the Purification of Mary or Candlemas. Originally in the first half of the fourth century, this feast was celebrated on February 14 (yes, Valentine's Day now), the 40th day after Epiphany, January 6, because Christmas was not celebrated as its own feast, and so, the Nativity, the Epiphany, the Baptism of the Lord (the Theophany), and the feast celebrating Christ's miracle in Cana were all celebrated in one day. By the last quarter of the fourth century, Church at Rome had begun to celebrate the Nativity on December 25 (Pagan feast of the Unconquerable Sun-Sol Invictus now the Unconquerable Son of God), so the Feast of the Presentation was moved to February 2, 40 days later. Candlemas got its origin through Simeon's prophecy of Jesus being 'a light to the revelation of the Gentiles." By the 11th century, the custom had developed in the West of blessing candles on the Feast of the Presentation. The candles would be lit and then a procession took place in a darkened church while the Canticle of Simeon (Nunc Dimitis) was sung. Candlemas is an important feast in most European countries. Second, we recognize Black History Month. We go back to 1915, (which celebrated the 50th anniversary of he 13th Amendment which abolished slavery in the United States) when Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History which is now called the Study of African American Life and History. This organization was dedicated to the researching and promoting achievements by Black American and other peoples of African descent. Eleven years later, the ASALH sponsored a National Nego History Week, which sponsored schools and communities to organize local celebrations, establish history clubs and host performances and lectures.

In years that followed, mayors of cities across our country began issuing yearly proclamations recognizing Negro History Week. By the late 1960's due largely to civil rights movement growing awareness of black history, Negro History Week became Black History Month across many college campuses in the United States of America. It was President Gerald Ford who officially recognized Black History Month in 1976 as the nation celebrated its Bicentennial. President Ford called the public to "seize the opportunity to honor too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans every endeavors throughout our history." Every president since President Ford has celebrated Black History Month. The Theme for this year's Black History Month is: Black Family: Representation, Identity, and Diversity Explained. Finally, we have the Feast of St. Blaise, Bishop and martyr. According to the legend Blasius was a physician at Sebaste before he was raised to the episcopal see. At the time of the persecution under Licinius he was taken prisoner at the command of the governor, Agricolaus. The hunters of the governor found him in the wilderness in a cave to which he had retired and while in prison he performed a wonderful cure of a boy who had a fishbone in his throat and who was in danger of choking to death. After suffering various forms of torture St. Blasius was beheaded. 




