PASTORS REPORT

Dear Parishioners:

It is hard to believe! We are remembering the 20th Anniversary of 9/11 when four planes were hijacked by Islamic terrorists on September 11, 2011. Two planes hit the twin towers in New York City, one hit the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and another most likely intended for the U.S. Capitol landed in Shanksville, Pennsylvania as passengers fought back (Flight 93). Most of us who are 25 years of age or older can remember what we were doing at that time. At that time, I was in St. Patrick's, Audubon and Holy Trinity, Exira and getting ready to put missiles from the porch to the church when my Office Manager, Lois Kauffmann, informed me that a plane had hit one of the twin towers in New York City. Within minutes, another plane hit the other tower. We figured it was not good. Over 3000 lives were lost that day. For myself, that day seemed like yesterday. It was a day that I will never forget as we gathered in prayer to pray for our country. As a way to remember those who have lost their lives, I am going to have a Mass at 9 a.m. at St. Thomas Aguinas. I would invite our parishioners to attend to remember all the heroes who gave their lives for the cause of freedom, freedom that hangs on a thread even today, with the suppression of free speech and censorship by the media. That is the truth folks! We all need to wake up and see how vulnerable our freedoms are and never take them for granted, including the freedom to worship God inside and outside of our church structure.

On another note, Monday September 6 is Labor Day. We are indebted to those who bore the brunt of violent actions toward them for standing up for oppressive working conditions and can celebrate this as a day off. It was common in the late 19th century that the Industrial Revolution made working life miserable for people around the world. In sweatshops, mines, factories, railroads, mills, children and adults were subjected to 12 hour days. six days a week under unsafe and unhealthy working conditions. Organized strikes and rallies began in the 1860s and 1870s, as the labor movement fought for shorter work days and safer conditions. Oregon became the first state to designate a Labor Day holiday, followed by Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York. On May 1, 1886, workers flooded the streets to demand an eight-hour work day, known as the Haymarket Riot. Demonstrations lasted for days. Seven police officers and eight civilians were killed. In 1889, an international gathering of socialists in Parish officially declared May Day a holiday honoring workers' rights. President Grover Cleveland pressed state legislators to

select September instead. By 1894, U.S. states had adopted Labor Day. Yet, it would take another clash before Labor Day was declared an Official holiday. On May 11, 1894, workers at Pullman Palace Car Company, a railroad car manufacturer near Chicago, went on strike to protest their low wages and 16 hour workdays. Then, on June 22, members of the powerful American Railway Union joined their struggle by refusing to move Pullman's cars from one train to another, thus stalling and wounding rail traffic across the country. Politicians sought to placate the labor movement by introducing legislation to designate Labor Day as a public holiday. President Grover Cleveland signed it into law on June 28, 1894. Yet, it would take another 44 years to set a minimum wage, mandate a shorter work week, and limit child labor with the 1938 Fair Labor Standards Act. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor once stated in the New York Times in 1910, "Labor Day marks a new epoch in the annals of human history, among all the festive days of the year...there is not one which stands so conspicuously for social advancement of the common people as the first Monday in September." 
